- Resilience

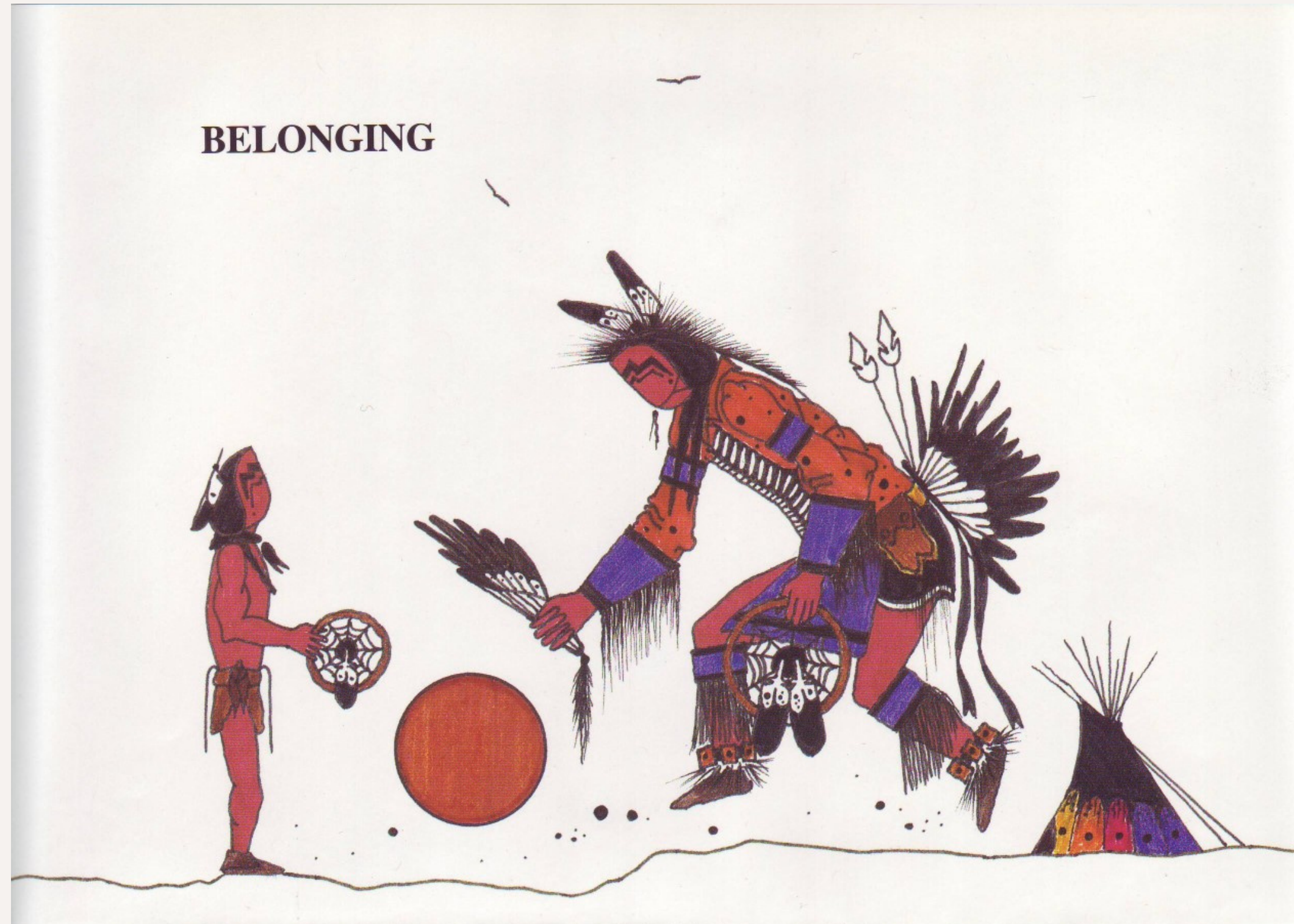

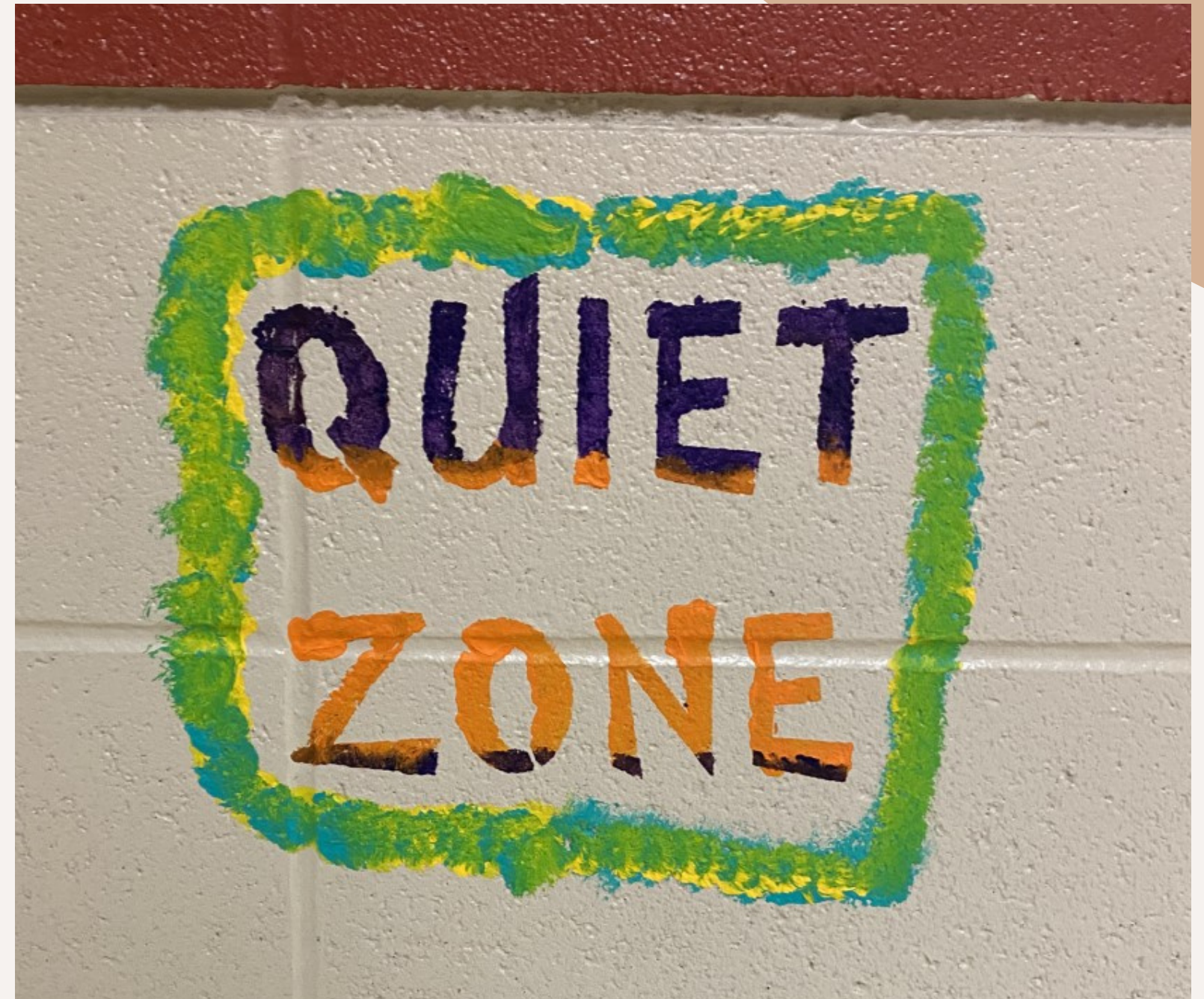




Restorative Justice is aligned with the values of the Circle of Courage: It maintains student's dignity and heals a broken sense of belonging.

or small.

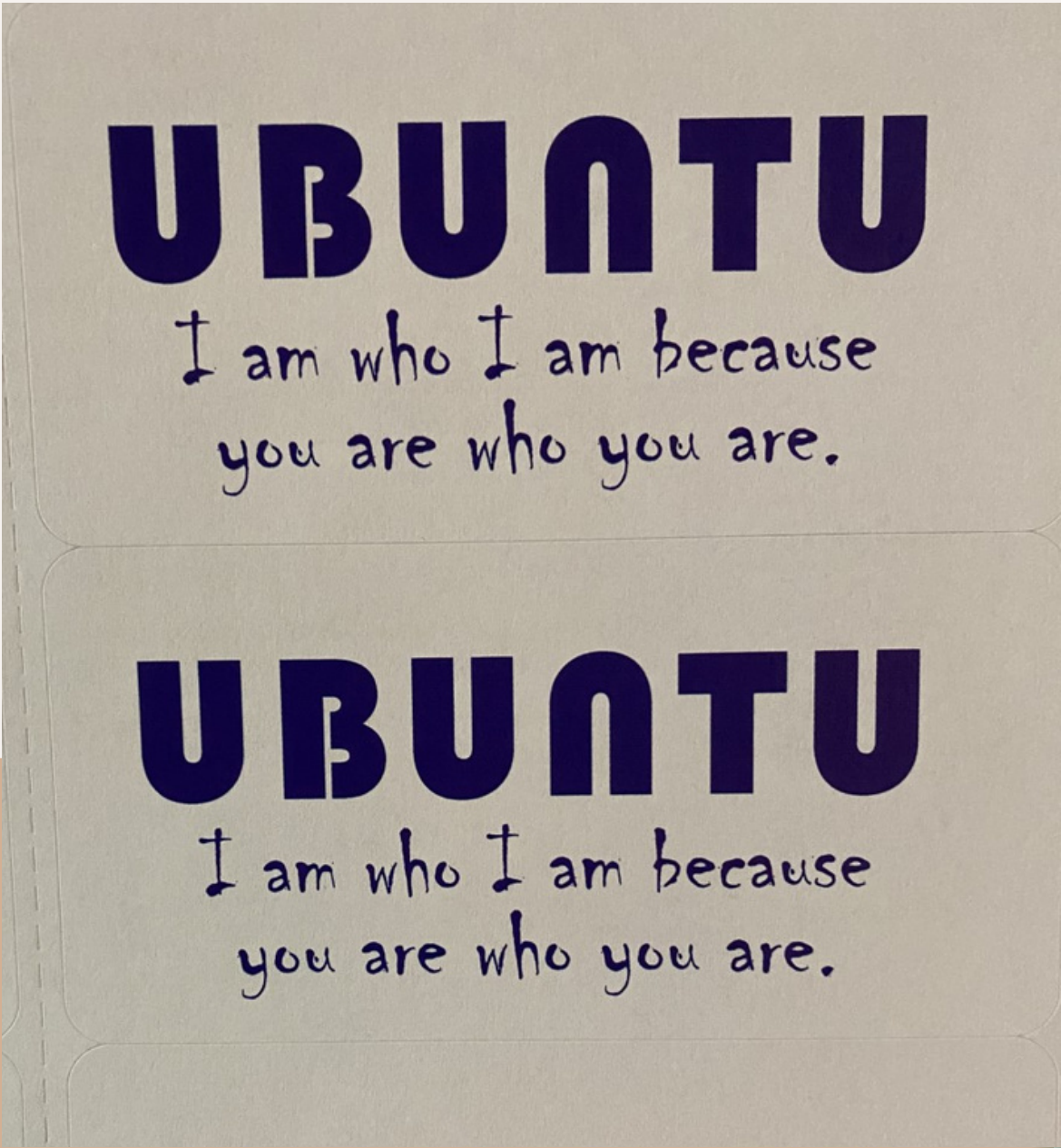


