










The Roots of "Scientific" Racism


In 1767, Swedish biologist Carl Linnaeus invented the fiction of biological *race* by classifying humans based on appearance and personality.

Europeanus White, gentle, inventive

Asiaticus Yellow, melancholy, greedy

Americanus Red, ill-tempered, subjugated

Africanus Black, impassive, lazy



Colonization was fueled by the belief that Western culture was "civilized" and superior to "savage" or "primitive" cultures.



Columbus Describes Natives:

Generous, kind, loving, extraordinarily timid, ingenious, men of commanding stature, with no weapons of war, and carrying on inter-island commerce in canoes longer and faster than Spanish 18-oared galleys.


Columbus then declared them and their lands owned by Spain, taking hostages to display in Europe.



Papal Bull of 1493

Pope Alexander VI "gave" the land to Christian monarchs of Spain, France, and Portugal because of the "inferior character of native cultures."


He instructed explorers and military leaders to convert, torture, enslave, or kill in order to seize the lands unless the foe was a "Christian prince" in which case he could keep the land.

The rallying cry for westward expansion: "God intended for superior Europeans to control North America."







Social Darwinism




Corrupting Darwin's Theory of Evolution Coined the term *survival of the fittest*.

Spencer justified racism, colonialism, and global domination that persists to this day.








The 1904 St. Louis World's Fair featured a **zoo of races.** Scientists arranged athletic contests trying to prove white superiority.




Franz Boas challenged widely held beliefs about race, intelligence, and white superiority. His research showed there was no biological basis for race.

Societies that are "civilized" are not superior to those considered "primitive."

Differences in peoples are based on "culture" which is the accumulated knowledge of a society.






Abraham Maslow and the Blackfoot in Alberta, Canada

Benedict arranged for Maslow to spend the summer of 1938 with the Blackfoot which totally transformed his view of human behavior.

Misuse of power by treating others like they are nobodies. Examples are racism, sexism, and bullying behavior.




Cumulative emotional and psychological wounding over the lifespan and across generations, resulting from massive group trauma and unresolved grief.



What is *Civilization*?


Europeans believed their culture was superior to socalled *primitive* societies.

When asked what he thought of Western civilization, Mahatma Gandhi replied, "I think that would be a good idea."

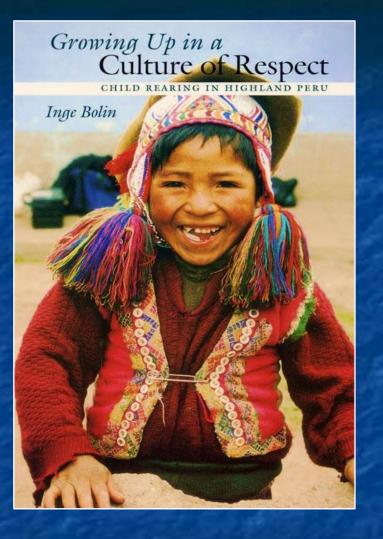
Two Kinds of Cultures

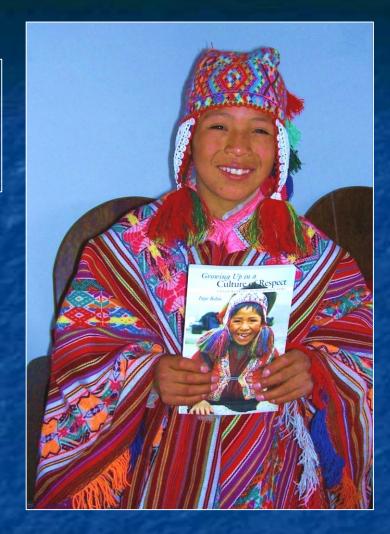
